Secretary's Report

At last a summer more like the 'good old days' before Covid, where all scheduled branch practices have taken place! Attendance at most practices has been good, with seventeen at the recent surprise major practice at Milton. Almost all of our towers rang on the death of the late HM Queen Elizabeth II and for her funeral, and also for the proclamation of King Charles III.

The Branch Ringing School continued, and Susan Read arranged for twelve learners and eight trainee teachers to attend different practice nights each week during the summer. Both the learners and the trainee teachers increased their confidence and ability to ring / run practices. The winter school involves sessions to teach new learners how to handle a bell. These take place on Saturday mornings alternately in Abingdon and Kirtlington.

Sadly I have to report the death of Berice Large, who was a loyal member of Marcham and a very long-standing Guild member. Many of you will remember her happiness in recent years at branch afternoon practices whenever she rang a touch of Stedman. Unfortunately I have very little information about Berice and her ringing life and so, if anyone can supply more details, please can you let Daphne know for inclusion in a future newsletter.

At the Branch Committee Meeting in October our Treasurer, Stuart Gibson, reported that branch membership currently stands at 237 from 25 towers, twelve down on last year. Fund raising during the year has been strong, with the barbecue and outing raising £554, and honey sales yielding £193. The Branch currently has funds totalling £6,400, with no donations to branch restoration projects so far this year. However there is one possible project on the horizon and another likely to go ahead, and donations towards these will need to be discussed and put to the AGM next year.

In June we held our 6-bell striking competition for the first time on a Saturday morning. This was a very successful event at North Moreton, with six teams entering. The results were: 1st Wantage (34 faults), 2nd Abingdon A (35 faults), 3rd Blewbury (45 faults), 4th Wallingford (56 faults), 5th Abingdon B (58 faults), 6th Radley and Steventon (71 faults). Our judges were Keith Osborne from Kent and William Stungo from Berkshire, and we would like to thank them for all their useful comments and for giving their time. The North Moreton ringers and friends provided a superb breakfast during the competition, which was enjoyed by all. The event was so successful we have decided that future competitions will be held on Saturday mornings. Wantage went on to represent the Branch at the Guild's competition and came 5th with only 17 faults.

The branch outing took place on Saturday, 23rd July. This year Philip Roberts took us to Weston on the Green, Aynho, Adderbury, Sandford St. Martin and Stonesfield. Some of us enjoyed lunch at the Red Lion, Adderbury, whilst others took advantage of the summer sunshine and had a picnic al fresco. Afternoon tea was arranged by Janette at Sandford St. Martin. Almost thirty members attended and thanks go to Philip and Janette for all their organisational skills. The outing was followed by a barbecue at the home of Stuart and Naomi Gibson. There were a record number of attendees (almost sixty members, partners and friends). As ever the food was excellent and thanks go to Stuart and Naomi for hosting this popular event for branch members.

By the time you read this the barn dance and supper at Harwell Village Hall, which was long post-poned from 2020 and 2021, should have been held on 12^{th} November. I really hope that it went well! Our annual New Year's ringing event is scheduled for 2^{nd} January 2023 in Steventon.

One of the afternoon branch practices was held at Long Wittenham, giving members an opportunity to ring the recently restored bells. Those who remember these bells will be absolutely blown away by the transformation. They are now a tuneful and easy going 6, a pleasure to ring and a world apart from how they were! Well done to the Long Wittenham ringers, and especially Julia Sargent who spearheaded the project through very difficult times. This also showcases the fantastic skills of Mark Walker and the Whites team who can tune and restore bells to very fine modern standards. We are very lucky to have their expertise on our doorstep.

Talking of which, after the Long Wittenham project we were anticipating a period of calm in terms of bell restorations within our branch. How wrong we were! In the potential pipeline following discussions at the committee meeting are North Moreton (augmentation to 8), Sparsholt (rehang and augmentation to 6), East and West Hendred (rehang), and even the possible reversal of the disabling of full circle ringing at Ardington. Sadly, the initial optimism we had for a full restoration of the derelict Culham bells seems to have faded.

This is a very exciting situation. Our branch has an enviable record for taking care of our bells, and if we continue on this path we will eventually run out of work. That would be a nice problem to have. Having good easy going bells and a comfortable ringing chamber are vital first steps for the sustainability of ringing, and creating a local community team. We do hope that members will help to support all of these extremely worthwhile projects in our branch in the coming years.

Finally, we must mention our appreciation to everyone who rose to the significant challenges of ringing for the passing of Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II and the Proclamation of King Charles III. No doubt ringing for the Coronation will be somewhat easier to organise.

Please maintain your enthusiasm, and we hope to see you at the branch practices or social events soon. Happy Christmas and a fun New Year to you all.

Branch Advanced Practices

The eagle eyed among you might have already noticed some new additions to the calendar for 2023. At a recent very well attended branch surprise major practice, we had a discussion. It was decided that the six Surprise Major practices should remain to cater for those who have little other opportunity to maintain their skills. However it was also thought that there was a need for 'Advanced' practices. These will be aimed at those branch members who have moved beyond plain courses of Plain Bob and Grandsire into more complicated methods and touches, but who are perhaps not quite ready to ring surprise methods. These Advanced practices will be designed for those at an interim level of method skills, and would include methods such as Stedman, St Clements, Kent Treble Bob, Cambridge Surprise, Double Court Minor, Double Norwich Court Bob Major and other six and eight bell methods. We have therefore decided to trial an additional five practices in the coming year for branch members at this skill level. Gill has arranged these, and you will see them on the branch calendar in this issue. I would encourage tower captains to identify ringers who you feel will enjoy and benefit from this type of ringing. Of course, we will also need our most experienced and capable ringers to support these practices in order to provide the best opportunities. We will see how they go, but please mark your diaries and talk to your rising skill ringers about these. Thank you.

The good news is that I am aware of one branch member who has kindly offered to be considered for the role of Social Events Planner (role 3). Therefore we are looking for a branch member to take on the role of Branch Practices Planner (role 2). All practices for 2023 have already been arranged and so it will initially only require the monthly advertising of practices from March 2023.

We have been quite fortunate at St Agatha's - not only to have such lovely bells, but also to have supportive neighbours and enough regular ringers to ring for most Sunday services - usually on 5 or 6 bells, but sometimes just 2 or 3. Our Tuesday practices have also been generally well supported, with regular help from Wallingford and other visitors.

We were able to ring all 8 bells by our own local band for the funeral of HM Queen on 19th September. This included 96 changes of Queens (fully muffled, with the tenor half-muffled), as well as some general ringing and some tolling. Indeed, our two young learners were able to toll the treble 60 times each, under the careful eye (and helping hand) of Rev. Kevin. We also rang / tolled on the day of her death and for the accession/proclamation.

Prior to that (on 19th July) we had achieved a ring of 840 Plain Bob Doubles - a belated celebration of the platinum jubilee. This was a first for everyone in the band (and probably our only 840). Details are in the Miscellaneous Performances section.

On a more parochial note, I am pleased to report a successful quarter and peal in memory of Roy Thorpe (RIP). On the day of the first anniversary of his death (24th July), we rang 1,260 Plain Bob Doubles (with the help of our friends at Wallingford) here at St Agatha's. See details in the list of quarters.

For the anniversary of his burial, we rang a peal (with the help of friends from the branch) on 10^{th} August. This was 5,056 Plain Bob Major, poignantly being the same method and composition, with the same conductor as Roy's last peal. And I am delighted to report that this was his first peal at his first attempt for Alex Davies, one of our local ringers. The full details are in the list of peals. It was also one occasion where locals commended us for the ringing - and were moved that it was for Roy - a well-known and loved figure in the village.

Aside from those special rings, we have hosted the Young Ringers' practices a couple of times and had a handful of visiting bands. It is a pleasure to hear all 8 of our bells being rung (well) on such occasions. And it's also pleasing to be told how nice our bells are!

Our last tower of the day was in Wantage and following our ring the group gathered in a local pub garden near the church for refreshments which included beer, soft drink, tea and even a hot chocolate.

We held a quarterly meeting of HSCR on Tuesday 7th June in the tower, the meeting was well attended with 10 members and 3 non-members.

Despite the very hot weather, the bells have been rung at St Andrews tower for practices and for services throughout July and August although on one Tuesday evening they rang the bells for just an hour for practice due to the HOT weather!

DISAPPOINTING Sadly the Duck Race had to be cancelled on Sunday 28th August as the stream did not have enough water in it for the ducks to swim down. They will go back into training and hopefully will be back next year!!

We rang for five weddings during the summer months, the first being that of our Tower Keeper's daughter in early May. The wedding on 6th August was that of the eldest daughter of one of our ringers, Janet Corderoy.

We were all shocked and sadden to hear that our Queen, Elizabeth II, passed away peacefully on Thursday 8th September. Details of what bell towers and ringers were to do on the event of the death of her Majesty had been kept in the tower and therefore needed to be put into action, in accordance with the relevant directive in the Operation London Bridge Plan. Several of our ringers were away on 8th September, including our Tower Keeper, John Napper. After a few phone calls and with the aid of John's sister Joy, our second set of bell muffs were located. The bells needed to be fully muffled with the exception of the tenor, which is only muffled on one side. All the other bell clappers had to have two muffles on them, one on each side. A big thank you to Daniel, our deputy Tower Keeper and Alan Foster for getting the bells down and putting the muffles on. Alan tolled the tenor bell 96 times at midday on Friday 9th September. Jeff Powell, our chairman, sent out an e-mail to all of our ringers inviting them to ring the bells for 30 minutes on Saturday 10th September at 11:00. There were more than 14 ringers in the tower that morning.

Practice night was cancelled on Tuesday 13th September.

The bells were rung for the pet service on Sunday 18th September

About 14 ringers came to ring the bells for 30 minutes at 10:00 for the Queen's State Funeral on Monday 19th September; this enabled those who rang the bells time to get home to watch the funeral at 11:00. This was an historic moment because the bells are only rung fully muffled on the death of a Monarch.

We decided that on Tuesday 20th September, our practice night, that we would ring them muffled but would ring them down at the end of the practice to remove all the muffles.

Queen Elizabeth II R.I.P God Bless her.

God save the King.

We held our tower quarterly meeting on Tuesday 11th October following a shortened ringing practice. The meeting was due to be held on the first Tuesday of October but unfortunately there were too many members unavailable so the meeting was moved to the second Tuesday in October.

Ringer's Sunday took place on Sunday 23rd October, the bells were rung for the Ringer's Evensong at 6:00. A big thank you to Fr Jason for taking such a lovely relaxed and enjoyable service and for playing the organ for the bellringing hymns, the service was followed by light refreshments. At 5:00 an horrendous thunderstorm swept through the village so a big thank you to those who turned out to support this service in such awful conditions.

We rang the bells half muffled on Remembrance Sunday and left the muffles on for the practice on the Tuesday evening.

Handbell practices are under way ready for the Christmas Tree Festival and the group are hoping to perform in the afternoon on the second Saturday of the festival, 17th December.

Sunday and Thursday practice ringing continues as usual.

To celebrate the Platinum Jubilee of HM Queen Elizabeth II, a short piece of ringing took place on Friday 3rd June to coincide with the Service of Thanksgiving being held at St Paul's. Also to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee, a Quarter Peal was rung on Thursday 9th June (details are in the Miscellaneous and QP sections).

Like the majority of other towers, we rang on the sad occasion of the death of Queen Elizabeth II. The Tenor was tolled, half-muffled, for one hour from 12 noon on the day following her death, and then on Monday 19th September, a Quarter of PB Doubles was attempted but failed after 720 changes (details in the Miscellaneous section). This was rung fully muffled, with the tenor open at backstroke, before the funeral service of Her Majesty.

We also rang before the Service of Thanksgiving for our Churchwarden who sadly died from Cancer, after a very short illness.

A half-muffled quarter peal was rung on Remembrance Sunday.

The Branch afternoon practice was held at Radley in July with only 8 people attending. Visiting ringers from the Bradfield Course also visited on 19th August, and we have also rung for two weddings, and a funeral (ringing both before and after the service was requested!).

We participated in the Branch 6 Bell Striking Competition on Saturday 18th June at North Moreton. We won the competition ringing Grandsire Doubles. The morning set up for the competition seemed to work well and the bacon and sausage sandwich breakfast laid on by the locals was a great bonus.

Our new Vicar came in July and we rang for her installation service. We successfully scored a Quarter Peal of Grandsire Doubles prior to her first service on Sunday 24th July.

In August one of our own (Dick Peters) celebrated a significant birthday. As his family were visiting, we welcomed them to our practice night so Dick could ring in a band that included his son and grandson. This also included his granddaughter who has only been learning since March. As this was the first time that Dick had rung with her, he called the changes. A fitting way to celebrate with three generations of one family all ringing together.

4 of us shared tolling 96 times for the death of Queen Elizabeth II on 9th September. We rang an open (un-muffled) Quarter Peal of Plain Bob Doubles on Sunday 11th September following the Mayor's Proclamation for King Charles in Wantage Market place that afternoon. We were very pleased to have been included on the Mayor's social media platforms and are grateful for the joined-up communication between his office, ourselves and the Church at this time. 9 of us then participated in half muffled general ringing on Monday 19th September prior to the State Funeral.

On Saturday 1st October our team took part in the Guild 6 Bell Striking Competition Finals held at Shaw-cum-Donnington on a very lovely sunny afternoon. We did ourselves proud considering we ring a 21cwt 8 and the competition bells were a 7cwt 6. We came 5th with 17 faults, very closely behind the winners who got 10 faults, the next team got 14, and joint 3rd place got 16.5. So we were pleased with ourselves.

Due to illness and other commitments we had to cancel our summer outing day, also the fact that the temperature was going to exceed 33 wasn't going to help. We aim to reschedule that for next year. We have had some request from Scouts and Guides and are in the process of producing a plan for visitors to the church and tower, which can hopefully take place early next year.

RINGING RECOVERY

The Steering Group of this National initiative, after due consideration, advised in July 2022 that the role of the Survival and Recovery Group had run its course. Whilst nationally the group has closed, there remained some follow-up from the Branch survey to address. Where towers identified the need for extra ringers on Sundays, help at practices and with recruitment, a meeting took place with the Branch Ringing Masters, raising awareness of the needs of individual towers.

For those towers hoping to recruit more members, one tower was recently successful in attracting six learners, two of whom had already learnt to ring! In case it is helpful, below is the text for the poster used which could be easily customized for your tower.

Recruitment

In Abingdon, we make a special effort to recruit young people to learn to ring and hold a practice after school on Fridays for 10-18 year old school-children with the help of three of our former youngsters who are now accredited ART teachers. We vary in success with some young people going on to join the adult team and others deciding it isn't for them, but on the whole it has been a worthwhile way of recruiting.

In the summer, one of our adult ringers pointed out that we weren't doing anything to attract adults into ringing in Abingdon. We run the Branch Ringing School which gives extra handling lessons for learners from in and around our branch on Saturday mornings from October to March each year, but almost none of the learners were from our tower. It was a wake-up call for me and I thought about it.

How would we go about teaching adults if anyone did want to learn to ring with us?

We could use the Ringing School to help them learn to ring, but they would need to learn with our own band too and we take it as read that snatching the odd 10 minutes during a normal practice night is not a good way to teach handling. But it does integrate the learners into the band. We came to the conclusion that if we taught for around half an hour before our practice and allowed an overlap of say fifteen minutes as the other ringers arrived, it might work. We already have five or six ART trained teachers in the band and they would probably agree to come to practices early and teach. A sort of plan!

But how would we find people interested in ringing? I was idly looking at my phone and at a social media website "NextDoor" where local people post messages about lost cats, outgrown children's clothes for sale, etc. I wondered if that might be a way to find one or two learners. Without much thought, I put a short notice there:

"Would you like to start ringing church bells? We're starting teaching a group of people who are interested to see if they like ringing. Teaching starts soon at St Helen's in Abingdon. Contact me for more information."

The website asked for a photo. Luckily I had a photo of the band who rang for the proclamation of the new king on my phone so posted that with the notice.

Within a day there were four responses from people interested. Within three days there were four more. We invited them all for a taster session at 7 pm at our tower and ended up holding three taster sessions / ringing lessons on successive weeks, and it looks like those lessons will continue for now.

Our taster sessions worked like this: We introduced them to all the teachers. We showed them the bells and explained how they worked with the clapper stays already on and someone primed to ring a bell up and down again with a few strokes and setting in between. Afterwards each person was allocated a teacher and given a short lesson in ringing. We explained the suggested lesson plan at the tower and the Ringing School. We showed them the ART Ringer's Personal Progress Logbook. We introduced them to the rest of the band and the visitors to the rest of the band. We gave out information about the Ringing School. And four of the newcomers completed the enrolment form and asked to come again!

We now have six new learners including those four, varying in age between perhaps 30 and 65. Five were women. Two were born overseas and have English as their second language. We are really happy and hope that they will continue to enjoy their time in the tower with us.

Of those who didn't take up ringing, one was 88 and worried about climbing so many steps; one was already really busy playing in a brass band; one hadn't realised it would be such a big commitment of his time and one had been volunteered by a friend and backed out without ever meeting us.

Overall, finding the people turned out to be the easiest part. The hard work starts now with making sure we give them all a really good experience of ringing and ringers!
