## Secretary's Report

After several attempts ever since 2020 we finally managed to hold our Ringing and Refreshments event on $2^{\text {nd }}$ January. This was a very popular occasion at Steventon, with almost forty attendees. Thanks go to the Steventon ringers and friends for their hospitality and for providing a superb range of soups and cakes on such a cold morning.


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Our AGM was once again held successfully by a Zoom meeting, ably hosted by our Chairman, Rob Nickless. It was attended by twenty-one members, including the Guild Master, Katie Lane, and our Guild Branch Steward, Patricia Newton. All branch officers remained in position apart from Charles Morrish, who relinquished his role of Vice-chairman and became one of the Joint Ringing Masters. He will fully take up position in September and Philip Roberts kindly offered to continue in this role until then. We welcome Jenny Bennett of Wantage to the position of Vicechairman. As the role of Branch Secretary has considerably expanded now that there are thirtytwo branch practices to organise each year together with four social events, the two new roles of Practices Secretary and Social Secretary were created. These have been taken up by Bridget Taylor of Harwell and Mandy Winters of Blewbury.

Our Treasurer, Stuart Gibson, reported that in 2022 the membership of the Branch was 240, a decrease of 7 from 2021. There were two fund raising events in 2022. The barbecue (including the raffle and tea proceeds) raised $£ 555$ and the Barn Dance $£ 337$. Honey sales resulted in donations of nearly $£ 200$. The Branch, for the sixth year, collected a voluntary $£ 2$ donation with subscriptions. Almost everyone made the contributions to put towards Branch bell restorations projects and $£ 466$ was collected. No grants were paid out in the year, but it was decided to support the North Moreton augmentation to 8 with $£ 1,500$, and the rehang/augmentation of Sparsholt with $£ 3,000$. A donation of $£ 500$ was made to the Oxford Diocesan Bell Fund. The Branch, at the end of 2022 , had funds in the region of $£ 6,000$, which is well in excess of the reserves required by the Branch.
Eleven new branch members were elected to the Guild: Millie Bauwens (Abingdon); Greg Locke (Aston Tirrold); Amelia Butterfield (Brightwell); Mark Collett (Cholsey); Jim Gulliver (Drayton); Rob Able, Paul Batho and Sarah Tenant-Flowers (East Hagbourne); Emily Young and Matthew Young (Milton); Simon Baker (Steventon). Sadly I have to report the passing of Jean Hazard, a former branch member and a ringer at West Hanney for many years.
Branch practices have taken place at East Hagbourne, Harwell, Wantage, Drayton and Long Wittenham. There have been afternoon practices at Chilton, Drayton, Brightwell, Marcham and Cumnor. Surprise practices were held at Brightwell and Harwell, with the practice at Wallingford cancelled through lack of support and a quarter peal of Stedman Triples rung in its place. We have also held two very successful advanced practices at North Moreton and Blewbury, aimed at introducing intermediate ringers to the more complicated plain methods and to treble bob.

We recently had a 'mini' outing of three towers (Islip, Bletchingdon and Kirtlington) with an excellent pub lunch in Sturdys Castle near Kidlington. This was attended by 15 branch members and was very successful, with good ringing at each of the towers.

Some dates for your diaries: The 6-bell striking competition and breakfast will be held on Saturday morning, $10^{\text {th }}$ June, at Long Wittenham. Our main branch outing is planned for Saturday, $15^{\text {th }}$ July and this will be followed by a barbecue at the home of Stuart and Naomi Gibson. Our autumn social event will be a quiz night and supper in Blewbury Village Hall on Saturday, $18^{\text {th }}$ November.
I look forward to seeing many of you on these occasions!

## Ringing Masters' Ramblings

## TOWER TALK


#### Abstract

Abingdon Like most places we had a very busy weekend of ringing in Abingdon for the coronations of HM King Charles III and HM Queen Camilla. We started on Friday by ringing for the town's civic service held in St Helen's. We managed 8 ringers for a while until one had to join the choir and we dropped down to the back 6 for a service touch. On Saturday afternoon we rang a quarter peal of Plain Bob Triples at St Helen's. This enabled Joe Gillett to ring his first quarter on 8 bells.

On Sunday morning we had the usual service ringing at both towers and then the ancient and rather quirky tradition of bun throwing in the afternoon. This takes place mostly for Royal occasions when the town councillors go to the top of the County Hall and throw buns to the assembled masses in the market square below. We always plan to ring St Nicolas bells while the buns are being thrown. This had been advertised as 4 pm but what we were not told was that there was an hour and a quarter's entertainment first, including Morris men and belly dancers, and the actual throwing was due at 5.15 pm . Some of our young ringers were bored and went to St Helen's for a ring to while away the time. In the end the ringing at St Nicolas was very well supported with most of our regular ringers, our young learners and a few who came back to ring after a long gap. We rang the coronation call changes and finished with a plain course of King Charles Delight Minor. On Monday we did our bit for the Help Out day by ringing tunes on handbells in the church and having the tower open. Several people had a go at ringing tunes and some were very good at it which hopefully means we will have some promising recruits. A steady stream of people made their way up the tower where they were shown the bells and ringing was demonstrated on a single tied bell. Quite a few people, including some quite small children, had a go ringing just the backstroke and again several expressed an interest in learning to ring. It also gave two or three of our local ringers the opportunity to try ringing with the simulator, covering to methods from Doubles to Cinques and ringing Plain Hunt Minor. That's something that we should do more often as it is a great way to improve the striking.

## Appleton

Ringing at Appleton has now returned to normal after the Covid-19 pandemic.
For the first time since March 2020, we were able to celebrate the $205^{\text {th }}$ Anniversary of the bells on $4^{\text {th }}$ March (this year on the actual day) with a peal of Stedman Caters successfully being rung in the morning and 64 people sitting down to dinner in the Village Hall. After dinner, handbells were "lapped" to Stedman Caters and Kent Treble Bob Major rung by a "scratch" band. Our traditional songs were sung and it was very good to see Norman Leslie taking part in the singing of a "Farmers Boy". Norm was a regular ringer at Appleton (along with his twin brother Den) until his marriage and always attended the March $4^{\text {th }}$ celebrations. We were very sorry to hear that a few weeks later Norm had a fall and sadly passed away in hospital. His funeral was held at Faringdon Church on $14^{\text {th }}$ April and many of the Appleton band and their families attended the service. We attempted a quarter peal later that afternoon, but unfortunately, it was miscalled.
We had a successful recruitment drive as part of the "Ring for the King" campaign and had 4 new recruits come forward from the Village, 2 of which Chantal and Walé are now ringing rounds. We also had 3 lapsed ringers come forward - two (Louise and Pat) learnt to ring at Aston and have not rung for 20 years and one (Clare) learnt to ring at Cumnor more recently.

We rang a peal of Cambridge Surprise Royal and a quarter peal of Grandsire Triples to celebrate the Coronation. We also had two sessions of general ringing, one on the Coronation Day and the other for the Village Service on $7^{\text {th }}$ May and were very pleased to see Chantal, Walé and Louise ringing rounds and Pat and Clare ringing rounds and call changes (Kings and Queens) - all their hard work paid off! On Monday $8^{\text {th }}$ May, we took part in the "Big Help Out" where all the village organisations had stands to attract volunteers - we had a steady stream of visitors to the tower with more than 30 people having a go at backstrokes, hopefully some of these will decide that ringing is for them.
We have now restarted practices on Friday evenings (7.30-9.00) and our priority at the moment is concentrating on getting our learners to ring rounds and call changes on 6 or 8 bells. We continue to ring for two Evensong services a month ( $2^{\text {nd }}$ and $4^{\text {th }}$ ) and have now restarted Sunday morning ringing - visitors are always welcome.

## North Moreton

## Part One:

At the time of writing this (mid-April) the project to augment the All Saints ring of six to eight bells, is on target.

The new bells will become the treble and number two. They were successfully cast a few days ago at Royal Eijsbouts foundry, in the Netherlands and will start their journey to North Moreton.
Meanwhile, we have not been idle. Whites, the bell hangers, plus volunteer labour re-configured the belfry, creating the additional frame to take the new bells. Young Charlie Nickless proved particularly useful; nimbler and with smaller hands, he managed many of the more awkward jobs.
There is more still to do. The bells will need tuning, delivered to All Saints and re-hung. Our ringers will need to tackle eight rather than six bells and with luck ring them loudly and clearly and hopefully accurately, for the Coronation.
Bearing in mind the restricted time scale - barely six months - to fund and deliver, this project will be quite an achievement.

## Part Two:

It seems a long time ago since writing the above. A number of things could have gone horribly wrong - but they didn't. Yes, there was a several day delay in the journey from foundry to Whites, but that time was made up. Three days were spent pushing, pulling, hauling and fixing by a load of men who seemed to be having the greatest of times. The bells, headstocks and ropes were all in place within three days.

## Part Three:

A week to go to C-Day. Still work to be done - 'fettling' was one of the jobs (and no, I don't know what that is), but on Tuesday, late afternoon, the new ring of eight sounded across the village, clear and sweet. Our lovely ring of six bells had become an even better ring of eight. It was a magical moment, but no magic involved, just a lot of hard graft, piles of 'bacon butties' and it must be admitted, our fair share of luck.

## Part Four and Conclusion:

Twenty ringers (see photo on p 4 ) gathered to ring on Coronation day. A party was held in the evening to celebrate. Both the Coronation of course, but more importantly for us, to celebrate a job well done.

## Thoughts on ONB Ringing

## General considerations

My election as Branch Ringing Master gives me a fresh reason to look at the issues related to getting pleasure from the pastime I have pursued since boyhood. Although my level of participation has ebbed and flowed over the years, it has always remained appealing. It turns out that the driving factors have probably changed from time to time. You might identify with some of the following:

Discovering the ins and outs of what makes the familiar sound of bells as we hear them.
Visiting areas of historical buildings that are usually out of bounds.
Understanding and mastering the technique of bell handling.
Meeting a whole new set of friends.
$A$ reason to visit towns and villages previously unknown.
Fascination at the concept of change ringing.
How far can I go with exploring the more complex methods?
Can I conduct?
Can I run a practice?
Can I help others benefit from my experience and enthusiasm?
The list could go on and on. The common theme is that these are positive driving forces. As with everything in life, there is always another side to the equation:

I am out of my depth and seem unable to master the art.
I feel looked down on by the good ringers.
I feel left out with nobody helping me and taking time to explain things.
I am putting in the effort, but my local band doesn't seem to progress.
I have mastered the basics but am stuck in a rut. It has become repetitive.
My work and family commitments don't fit in with the arrangements at my tower.
I am scared to take the plunge to show up somewhere I am not known.
Thinking about such issues guides my view of what Ringing Guilds and Associations exist for. Let me say right from the start, although there are necessary organisational and safety standards to maintain, I do believe that these are incidental to our main purpose. Although we need to give these due respect, our raison d'être is to enjoy our ringing individually and as a group, teach and promote the skills required to maintain acceptable standards of ringing and preserve our valuable assets whilst observing our function as servants of The Church.
At all costs, we must avoid projecting the image of a stuffy, elite and bureaucratic organisation which exists solely to perpetuate the importance of a chosen few. These are harsh words, but we can so easily fall into that trap.
I am reviewing what my role is. Let me lay my cards on the table. I am not the most accomplished ringer around, but I have a lot of experience and enthusiasm. I think it fair to rate myself as a steady Sunday service band member but limited in conducting skills. This leads me on to regard my Ringing Master role as a facilitator of aspirations. I may not have all the necessary skills at my fingertips. If I can't do it, I will try to enlist the right help. Importantly, this can only come to fruition if I am aware of need and desire.

## Meetings

Most participation is by attendance at meetings. I have turned my focus on what these should achieve. Hopefully there is a shared enjoyment in the social side and the interaction with new bells and different band members. Above this, many people will see meetings as an opportunity to extend their abilities, taking advantage of the extra strength in depth. I see this as a major incentive to attend, and long may it continue.
I need to be mindful of the positive and negatives such as those listed above. Everyone is different, with their own specific driving forces, fears and difficulties. So how might meetings be constructed to benefit all in attendance?

Generally, if we are good at something, we derive pleasure from it. The inverse is that we may put off attempting things we struggle with. There is considerable satisfaction to be gained with the success of achieving the next goal. Meetings need to provide the right incentive to persevere without the fear of embarrassment. I need to find a way of upholding the standard of ringing whilst accepting that failures will occur in the process of people's horizons.

Perhaps this can be solved by employing the following approach.

- Meetings should strive to send everyone home having achieved something, be it participation in well struck ringing, or advancing towards realistic goals.
- Attendance at a meeting should lead to enjoyment and not be seen as a duty.
- The structure of the ringing could have twin aims. When it is decided what the next piece of ringing will be, it should be made clear whether this is to be a showpiece with minimum errors, or an advancement piece where we accept the participants limitations.
- Showpieces would be aimed at technical competence and a demonstration of what good ringing sounds like. (It is too easy to lose track of what we are striving for when all we get is a diet of poor ringing because we aimed too high.) These should on no account be seen as elitist. Well struck rounds are quite as good as well struck London Surprise. Showpieces are an individual's opportunity to derive pleasure from demonstrating their skill at whatever level. Ringing is a team event where everyone is equally important to the outcome.
- Advancement pieces would be the opportunity to extend skills. There will be an expectation of completion of the piece, whilst accepting there may be flaws in the execution.
- When ringers come forward to catch hold for a piece of ringing, there should be a high degree of confidence in a successful outcome. Ringing meetings are not training events as such. It is reasonable to expect that good bell handling skills have already been acquired by new ringers, and proper preparation and homework has been undertaken for those upping their call change/method ringing.
- Placing bands as opposed to open invitations to catch hold is a tricky issue to get right. No-one wins when there are too many inexperienced ringers in a band. Who does and doesn't get invited to ring stirs up all sorts of emotions. Let it be said, it will only be done with the best of intentions and to achieve a positive result. It is very difficult to do this effectively and in a fair manner.
- To avoid disappointment, do not be a shrinking violet, speak up and let it be known what you aspire to and feel confident you can achieve. We should strive to have an atmosphere of encouragement and shared pleasure in the demonstration of an individual's skills or those of a band.
- Inclusion is a buzz word in today's society. We should cultivate the sort of atmosphere that attracts attendance. If only we could encourage ringers to give meetings a try and in return, we could reward them with a satisfying experience...


## Training

There already exists a framework for training, be it bell handling, advanced ringing or surprise methods. I am sure there is scope for tailor made training where need is identified. I would include longer length ringing such as quarter peals which are so valuable in aiding concentration, ropesight and good bell control. Again, communication on these matters is essential and individuals or tower captains should be encouraged to approach the committee or myself where help is required.

## Conclusion

Many ringers may be unaware of the possibilities that exist and what pleasure awaits them, should they choose to give it a try. The Guild is for all of us. Ringing should be fun, let's make the most of it.

May I encourage all towers to promote attendance at our meetings. Where there is nervousness, why not let me know in advance that you are coming. I will make sure you are duly welcomed and your needs catered for. There is nothing worse than turning up as an unknown ringer and being scared to stand up and ring! It is my duty to welcome you and to give you suitable ringing opportunities. It is your interest and enthusiasm that counts. I look forward to seeing you.

## And finally!

Last night was the evening meeting at Long Wittenham. It was very well attended (hurrah for that). Was I able to uphold my aims? Well no, not exactly. It proved a great deal harder to put into practise than I imagined. I am still not sure that I spoke to everyone, that individuals went home with a lasting sense of pleasure and that the selection of ringing was good enough to further their self belief.
I tried, but one thing is for sure, I need prompting from those that can see where there are gaps, and particularly, the needs and desires of an individual is being overlooked. It seems to me that much as for the actual ringing, the management of meetings is a team effort. I beg your help to make each meeting enjoyable for all. I want to make things work for everyone.

## The Renovation of Sparsholt Church Belfry

Of the four bells at Sparsholt Church, two date back to 1578 , one to 1603 and the last is more recent at 1914; they are all mounted within a wrought iron frame which was put in around the same time as the most recent bell.

The bells are considered to be well tuned; however, they are challenging to ring. The belfry requires renovation to improve the bearings of the bells, replace some of the wood on the bell wheels, renew the pully wheels and ensure the rope drops from the belfry to the ringing room on the ground floor are straight and the ropes are not rubbing where they pass through the three floor levels. As there is space in the bell frame, in addition to the renovation of the tower, it would also be possible to augment the existing four bells with an additional two bells, thereby making a ring of six.

Work is under way to plan the renovation and augmentation project; whilst fund raising has already secured some $£ 11,000$ of the estimated $£ 30,000$ total cost of the work.
The local bellringers are keen to ring at Sparsholt on a regular basis once the upgrade work on the tower has been completed and the bells are easier to ring. The discussion of the renovation project in the local community has generated a significant number of expressions of interest in learning how to ring the bells.
